Toledot 5782

Toledot opens with the statement "ve'eleh toledot Yitzchak ben Avraham... - and these were the descendants of Isaac, son of Abraham; Abraham fathered Isaac". Isaac's biggest contribution is that he continued the legacy of his father Abraham and passed it on to his son Jacob. We see this at the end of this week's sidra, where Isaac grants Jacob the blessing of Abraham.

Isaac and Rebecca were childless f or the first twenty years of their marriage. The Torah tells us that they both prayed for children and G-d answered their prayers. Rebecca became pregnant and was carrying twins who fought inside her womb. She received a prophecy that she was carrying two very different nations who would struggle with each other.

The Torah describes Esau as a ruddy, hairy baby who grew up to be a hunter. Our rabbis explain the phrase 'Esau hunted with his mouth' to mean that, not only was he a violent man, but he also used to trap people with his deceit. Jacob spent his time 'in tents', which is thought to refer to the tents of his righteous forebears, Shem (Noah's son), and Ever, Shem's great-grandson, both of whom were still alive.

Jacob and Esau grew up. One day, Esau, the older twin, returned from his hunting to find Jacob cooking some lentils. In a rather coarse way, he asked Jacob to pour him 'some of this red stuff'. In return, Jacob asked Esau to sell him his birthright. Isaac's first-born son was to be devoted to the service of G^Dd and to the sacred family traditions. Esau responded: *"Behold I am going to die, so what use do I have for a birthright?"* Esau sold the birthright to Jacob and the Torah testifies that Esau despised his birthright. (Ch. 25, v.34).

A major famine in the Land of Canaan (Israel) caused Isaac to move to the nearby land of the Philistines, possibly due to the wells dug there by his father Abraham, which were a vital source of water at that time. Blessed by G-d, Isaac was able to grow a large crop that year, despite the famine. He became very wealthy and the Philistines grew jealous, to the point that they stopped up Abraham's wells. King Avimelech expelled Isaac and his family, but then followed them all the way to Beersheva where they made a peace treaty.

The second half of *Toledot* deals with Jacob receiving the blessing intended for Esau, as a result of Jacob's deception of their father Isaac. This story is very complex. On the one hand, it seems that the Torah does not condone Jacob's behaviour, as he himself suffers, repeatedly being deceived, first by Lavan and then by his own sons in the Joseph story.

On the other hand, it is clear that Isaac himself came to realise that this blessing was destined for Jacob. We also see that Isaac later blessed Jacob with the precious blessing of Abraham, which included the right to the Land of Israel. This was never intended for Esau.

This week's *haftarah* contrasts G-d's love of Jacob with His rejection of Esau and concludes with the virtues of Aaron the High Priest and the ideal Kohen. "He walked with Me in peace and straightforwardness, he restored many from sin...they seek Torah from his mouth, for he is G-d's messenger."
